Seaside Currents

Beyond Paralysis



This is a great big world with a great many problems. This simple statement is for many the beginning of a kind of paralysis. "What can I do about it?" becomes the watchword for our inactivity. In other cases, our efforts to understand the complexities of problems around us create a well-intentioned "paralysis of analysis." Mother Teresa's approach to serving the poor has sometimes been criticized because it neglected the "root causes" of poverty and "only" sought to alleviate the sufferings of individuals. When confronted by a reporter and asked why she was helping a child, faint from malnutrition, when hundreds had just been injured in the collapse of a hospital across town, she is said to have informed the photographer that she was busy tending the needs of this child, then suggested that he go do what he could to help the injured across town. It is easy to allow "big needs" to paralyze us from offering the "small" graces that we can offer.

Sixties British rock star, Cliff Richard, once called the "bad boy of pop" and "too sexy for television," became a devout believer and disciple of Jesus. Back in the '70s, he visited missionary outposts in the Sudan and refugee camps in Bangladesh as part of a mission trip for Tear Fund. In his book about his conversion to Christianity, *Which One's Gift?*, he tells how, "The first morning, I must have washed my hands a dozen times. Whenever we stopped, I made a beeline for the communal tap or the well; I didn't want to touch anything, least of all the people. Everyone in those camps, even the babies, was covered in sores and scabs.

"I was bending down to one little mite, mainly for the photographer's benefit, and trying hard not to have too close a contact, when someone accidentally stood on the child's fingers. He screamed out, and as a reflex, I grabbed hold of him, forgetting all about his dirt and his sores. I remember now that warm little body clinging to me, and the crying instantly stopped. In that moment, I knew I had an enormous amount to learn about practical Christian loving, but at least I'd started."

He agonizes over the fact that the global needs are so great, and what we can do is so small. So what if the Tear Fund supports a handful of Bangladesh refugees when the numbers who need help queue in the tens of millions? It's only a tiny drop in a vast bucket. To which Richard responds: "Drop it may be, but at least the bucket's moist. Something is happening; somebody is being helped."*

Look around you this week and as you do, pray that God will "Help you to see the needs around you, and to respond appropriately."

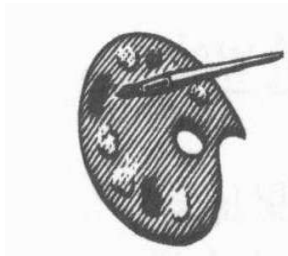

Assembly 2010

More than 6,500 women from 20 countries and 5 continents came together for the 2010 United Methodist Women's Assembly in St. Louis, Missouri that was held from April 30th-May 2nd. Under the inspirational theme of *Faith* Hope* Love in Action*, women gathered to worship, learn, serve, and witness to the power of women dedicated to mission. Seven speakers and worship leaders led us.

We enjoyed performances from groups at two of United Methodist Women's national mission institutions for children and youth: Lessie Bates Davis Neighborhood House (African Dance) in Illinois (100 years in service), and Della Lamb Community Center and Charter School (Children's Choir) in Missouri (112 years in service).

The call for prayer shawls for Assembly included a call for baby blankets. Shawls (4,059) and baby blankets (5,952) received will be distributed to health institutions and prison ministries that work with women, children, and youth. A limited number of prayer shawls were available to those attending for a \$25 donation going to missions. Nearly 600 women volunteered for the Ubuntu Day of Community Service in St. Louis on Thursday, April 29th. More than 1,400 of the baby blankets received were included in birthing kits assembled as part of the Day of Service. Saturday saw 2,000 people marching to a city park in support of immigrant, civil, and human rights.

A dozen women and one man were commissioned as both deacon and deaconesses, or home missionaries of the United Methodist Church. Commissioned from North Carolina was Lisa S. Bachman, in wellness and evangelism ministries. Through the Internet-based telecommunications operator, Skype, retired missionaries and deaconesses from Brooks Howell Home in Asheville, North Carolina, took part in our Friday night worship service.

Lastly, the Women's Division has given *Response* magazine a newly updated format beginning with the May issue.

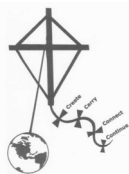

Miriam said she had made plane and hotel reservations as soon as they returned to Rockingham, and took Trabert up on his ticket offer. She said they had a wonderful time.

Another wonderful trip was to England for their 50th wedding anniversary. Their girls wanted to throw a big party. Miriam said that Raymond told them they could have a party if they wanted, but that Miriam and he were going to England. Jacque and Miriam gave in to their wishes and accompanied them on their trip.

BLUE RIBBON CHILI

1 lb Hamburger

1 lb Hot Sausage

1 -24 oz can Diced Tomatoes

2 -15 oz can Red Beans

1 Japaleno Peper (diced)

1 Small Onion (diced)

1 tsp Chili Powder

1 tsp Salt

1 tsp Black Pepper

1 tsp Paprika

(optional Crushed Red Pepper to taste)

Brown Hamburger and Sausage and drain
Place in Crock Pot or slow Cooker and add diced tomatoes, beans, pepper and onion and add spices. bring to a boil and lower to simmer for 1 hour or as long as 8 hours. Add crushed red pepper to taste or not! Note a little at a time. You can always add more but you can't take it out.
