Summer

Summer signals a change in our orientation. For the ancients, it was the growing season when the focus of life revolved around tending fields and waiting for harvest. For American school children throughout the middle of the century, the agricultural influence remained as children left the confines of the classroom to work in the fields. As we moved away from the agrarian economy, but before the era of video games, summers began to take on an air of leisure, outdoor play and fun.

We were never big travelers, so as a youngster, my summers were usually spent with my grandparents in Louisville, playing stick-ball and kick-the-can with the neighborhood kids in the middle of Brentwood Ave—always attentive to the warning cry of “CAR!” We looked forward to the all-important trips to the Wyandott Pool or Iroquois Park and an ice-cream cone at Ehrler's. Once in a while, there might even be a boat ride on the Ohio.

Summer was also a time of imagination and creativity. Once, a group of neighborhood kids and I discovered my grandmother's old Royal typewriter. It was heavy as an anvil and the keys would easily jam. But the old typewriter allowed us to imagine ourselves as publishers and the upstairs room at my grandparent's became our newsroom. Using sheets of carbon paper and with much painstaking effort, we hand-typed weekly editions of *The Brentwood Times*. We sold copies door-to-door for a dime. Then, late in the summer, we pooled our collected dimes and took them to the stable on Southern Parkway's Bridle path and rode horses to the park. No doubt there was a generous soul who chipped in to make up the difference between our dimes and the cost of the ride.

Even today, summers are rarely characterized by the structured, day-to-day orientation of work and school. Suggested summer reading lists pop up in every newspaper and magazine. At a resort area like Sunset and Ocean Isle Beaches, our guests find summer days often include a trip to the beach, eating seafood in Calabash and maybe stopping by the Creamery for that ice-cream cone (some things about summer never change!). It is a time when we stop, catch our breath, rejoice in God's creation and find renewal.

The life of the church also makes a shift in the summer months. We move from the more or less structured “High” church seasons of Lent and Easter and into the season *after* Pentecost—a span of the church year that lasts till the end of November. The liturgical color, like the color of summer itself, is green, signifying the season of growth toward maturity. Our readings in worship do not so much revolve around certain pivotal events in Jesus life, but simply follow the story of Jesus in the gospels, one story after another (the fancy church word for this is “*Lectio continua*”—continuous reading). This year, our Gospel readings flow from the Gospel of Matthew.

I commend summer to you with a suggestion. Get out in the sun (but wear sunscreen). Enjoy an unstructured day or three. Use your imagination and be creative. And finally, add the Gospel of Matthew to your summer reading list. And may the grace of God fill your days with goodness.

2011 UMM Golf Tournament

Our United Methodist Men are glad to announce that our annual Golf Tournament will be held this year at Sea Trail on the Maples course on June 25 at 9AM. The entrance fee for each player will be \$67.00, which is the same price as last year.

As many of you know the UMM has two fund raisers each year that provide the funds that we distribute to organizations, mainly locally, but also some that are far-reaching. Due to an excellent golf tournament and very successful Christmas sale, we will be able to contribute \$15,000 this year compared to \$9,000 last year. Hopefully, we will have another very good tournament this year so that we can continue assisting the organizations that assist the needy within our community.

Within our church we provide funds for our Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, one-time scholarships for our active members and active non-members, and provide turkeys to needy members at Thanksgiving. We also have a line item in our budget for the food pantry. We take up an offering at each meeting for the food pantry. As you can see, our organization provides assistance to persons here and abroad.

Domestic Violence

Domestic Violence is a crime. It is abuse between former or current partners. It affects men, women, and children directly or indirectly.

Examples of Physical Abuse:

- Pushing or shoving
- Slapping or hitting
- Pulling hair
- Kicking or punching
- Restraining with force
- Choking
- Throwing objects at someone
- Abandonment in dangerous places

Examples of Emotional Abuse:

- Ignoring feelings
- Withholding approval, appreciation, or affection as punishment
- Continual criticism, name-calling, shouting
- Humiliation in public and /or private
- Ridicule of beliefs, religion, race, and heritage
- Manipulation
- Reckless Driving
- Demeaning remarks
- Putting someone down and making them feel bad about themselves
- Making someone think they are crazy
- Mind games

Examples of Sexual abuse:

- Forcing the removal of clothes
- Touching in uncomfortable ways
- Treating in uncomfortable ways
- Forcing sex
- Accusations of relationships with others

Economic Abuse:

- Trying to keep someone from getting or holding a job
- Making someone ask for money
- Giving someone an allowance
- Taking their money

Using Children:

- Making them feel guilty about the children, using the children to give messages, using visitation as a way to her harass someone

Threats:

- Making and /or carrying out threats to do something to hurt someone psychically or emotionally
- Threatening to take the children. To commit suicide, or to report someone to welfare services or DSS

Isolation:

- Controlling what someone does, who they see, talk to, or where they go

Why People Batter:

Batterers use power and control tactics because:

1. It is learned behavior
2. It works
3. They can

- Do you know someone who is being abused?
- Do you know what to do to help them?

CALL 911, your local Police Dept, or Sheriff's Dept.

I thought this would be a good article to follow up on our guest speaker Pam Rose from "The Carousel Center for Abused Children." She spoke at our UMW meeting on May 9th.

Mrs. Rose told our group that 84% of the children that are brought to their shelter were physically and sexually abused—this is unacceptable. We should not tolerate this as Christians, mothers, fathers, or grandparents. We need to take a stand.

I have seen this first hand as a paramedic. I have taken care of a baby who was not yet old enough to speak to say, "My mom's boyfriend burned me," or a teenage girl who did not want to tell her mom that her boyfriend grabbed her hair and then threw her across the room. Her face hit a table and left her eye bloody and bruised. She was defending her three-year-old sister. Remember: "Children are a gift of God." This means all children! No matter what race, sex, or religion.

Country Fair News

The countdown is now at 3 months and 3 weeks until our biggest event of the year. Every event leader and all team members are working very hard to make this the best Country Fair ever. Some things will be the same, and some things will be different—just make sure that you read your bulletin carefully from now on for the announcements. We will keep you updated on a regular basis.

The dates for the Fair are Sept. 16th and 17th. Rain dates are set for Sept. 23rd and 24th. Make sure these dates are written on your calendars. The Kick-off Concert will be held on Sept. 10th featuring the Masters Men. This group did our kick-off concert two years ago, and the people that attended said it was the best group to have visited our church. We hope that this date will also be added to your calendar because you won't want to miss this special program. Ticket prices and availability will be announced in the bulletins and in the next newsletter. Be watching for the news!

Friday night, Sept. 16th, will be the Country Fair dinner—mostly the same fare as last year. We had a very successful turnout and a good meal at a reasonable price. Cathy Story promises more of the same. Details to follow.

One new event that is being added to the Fair for Saturday, Sept. 17th is a Children's Arena. Linda McPherson has graciously accepted the leadership role and plans to have a very special area for our children in which to participate. The area will be a safe place for the children to play while the parents shop. Two large inflatables have been purchased for use that day at a cost of \$325, which the Country Fair membership voted to accept. Since that vote, one very generous member of our congregation has offered to pay half the cost. The challenge now is to see if there is anyone else who would like to pay the other half. If not, the Country Fair will assume the expense. We think that this will be a unique opportunity for our children to feel as though they are included in the events of the Fair, and we are very thankful for the adults who are willing to assume the responsibility for this program.

On a different note, items for the yard sale and for the clothing sale continue to be coming in at a good pace. Remember that these items for the yard sale should be in good, workable condition and that the items for the clothing sale should be in good repair and clean.

There is a need for more jewelry, and soon if it needs to be repaired and/or cleaned. If you have pieces that are 10K, 14K, or 18K we will exchange them for the monetary value. Douglas Diamonds in Shallotte works well with Colleen, giving us top price for gold because the owner is aware that this money goes for the Church Fair. So clean out your jewelry boxes and get those pieces turned into the big box in the gallery as soon as possible.

The most immediate need at this time is for items for the silent auction and the live auction. Services, as well as your treasured possessions can be donated to the silent auction. Any items such as furniture, cars, boats, jet skis, lawn mowers, plows, large appliances, etc. can be donated to the live auction. Remember that you can receive help in bringing all these items to the church by calling and scheduling a pick-up time with Carol. She will get your message to Wayne, Ron or Mike—and they will come get your donations.

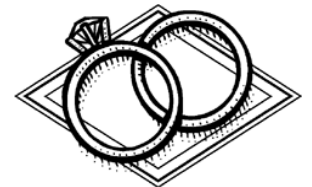

Water - at least 1 gallon daily per person for 3 to 7 days

Food - at least enough for 3 to 7 days

- non-perishable packaged or canned food / juices
- foods for infants or the elderly
- snack foods
- non-electric can opener
- cooking tools / fuel
- paper plates / plastic utensils

Blankets / Pillows, etc.

Clothing - seasonal/rain gear/ sturdy shoes

First Aid Kit / Medicines / Prescription Drugs

Special Items - for babies and the elderly

Toiletries / Hygiene items / Moisture wipes

Flashlight / Batteries

Radio - Battery operated and NOAA weather radio

Telephones - Fully charged cell phone with extra battery and a traditional (not cordless) telephone set

Cash (with some small bills) and Credit Cards - Banks and ATMs may not be available for extended periods

Keys

Toys, Books and Games

Important documents - in a waterproof container or watertight resealable plastic bag - insurance, medical records, bank account numbers, Social Security card, etc.

Tools - keep a set with you during the storm

Vehicle fuel tanks filled

Pet care items

- proper identification / immunization records / medications
- ample supply of food and water
- a carrier or cage
- muzzle and leash
